“A NIGHT’S WELCOME” MINISTRY

Through the generosity of the church, we had a successful 2011 “A Night’s Welcome.” In association with H.E.L.P. Hampton Baptist Church provided meals and lodging from 7:00pm, Saturday, February 26 through 7:00am, March 5.

We are grateful to all who participated including individuals who gave financially and volunteered their time, and to the many participating groups which included: Langley Baptist Church, HBC’s Soup Kitchen volunteers, Wednesday Night Supper staff, the Hiker/Biker/Spiker Chicks, HBC’s Youth and several Sunday School Classes. I personally wish to extend my appreciation to my ministry co-coordinators, Jane Austin and Nancy Sandford.

With the help of the Peninsula Food Bank and The Bread Ministry, we were able to prepare dinner and breakfast each day for about \$100. Our total guest count for the week was 485 adults & 2 children; we served 1,700 meals, and had 212 volunteers who logged in a total of 775.5 volunteer hours.

AUDITING COMMITTEE

The Auditing Committee is in the process of reviewing the financial records and procedures of HBC for 2011. The Financial Secretary's reports reasonably reflect the financial activities of the church for the year, in the form of a cash flow statement, submitted monthly to the Deacons.

The Finance Counting Committee collects, records and deposits all monies received. The Financial Secretary posts all receipts in the church management software, as designated by the contributor. A percentage of undesignated contributions are sent to the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship.

The Treasurer provides all authorized receipts, expenditures and pertinent financial information to David Hurst, CPA, for processing. Mr. Hurst is contracted to provide general bookkeeping functions, including all payroll services, under the direction of the Treasurer, on site. He generates monthly Treasurer’s reports for the Deacons and provides the financial data for the Financial Secretary to compile the monthly cash flow statement. All checks written in 2011 were authorized expenditures and properly co-signed. The accountant reconciles bank statements monthly.

The Treasurer, Accountant and Financial Secretary discuss expenditures, as needed, to insure proper account distribution and to maintain accepted accounting procedures. Monitoring of procedures is ongoing throughout the year.

The Investment Management Committee performs its duties to maintain and oversee the assets of the church. Withdrawals for 2011 were made in response to authorized funding needs. The investment records are reconciled per statement cycle of monthly/quarterly and a quarterly statement is provided to the Deacons with current values.

Upon completion of the audit, any additional reporting and recommendations will be forthcoming to the Board of Deacons.

EDUCATIONAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

In 2011 the Educational Advisory Committee planned and offered eight adult Bible studies during Wednesday evening. These studies were on a wide range of topics to meet the many different stages of faith development and interest. The studies offered were:

This year we did not offer as many studies in the hope that consolidating our adults would offer opportunities for our church to have more unifying Bible study experiences during the transition into an interim pastor.

In 2011 we once again tapped into the spiritual and scriptural insights and perspectives of our church family by asking them to contribute to our Lenten and Advent devotional booklets. Our children also contributed to the Advent book with their artistic drawings.

We began planning and promoting Education Sunday in September which we hoped would include a Sunday School breakfast and training time on the Saturday prior to the Sunday. When the only date that we could do it was September 11th we realized with Bay Days and the 10th anniversary of 9/11

happening that same weekend it would not be an appropriate time for the event. We cancelled our plans with hopes to do it sometime in the future.

In the summer we had another outstanding Vacation Bible School with the theme "Pandemonium". FINANCE COUNTING COMMITTEE

The Finance Counting Committee is responsible for receiving each Sunday's offering and counting the offering as designated by each contributor. We then deposit the funds into the church's checking account and certify the results to the church officials. The committee is made up of 19 members and divided into three (3) separate groups. Each group meets on Monday morning on a three week rotating basis. When a committee member is unable to be present on their scheduled Monday, a member from another group volunteers to serve in their place.

The Committee's weekly counting report and other appropriate items are given to the church's Financial Secretary for data input into a church management computer program and to the church's accountant for data input into the church accounting computer program. This procedure provides a more timely availability of all financial data.

FINANCE PLANNING COMMITTEE

The finance planning committee developed the schedule for the financial program and presented it to the deacons and church for approval in the spring. We met during the summer to develop the proposed budget for 2012 and presented it to the deacons in September along with a review of year to date receipts and expenditures prepared by our Financial Secretary. The budget was approved by the deacons in September. It was presented to the church at a Wednesday night business meeting in early October and was approved by the church on the following Sunday. Pledge cards were mailed in October and results were presented to the deacons in November.

Budgetary receipts decreased from 2010 to 2011 and funds were transferred from savings in order to cover budgetary expenditures for the year. The approved budget of \$571,353 for 2012 represents an approximate 3% decrease from the 2011 budget.

Our committee wishes to express our gratitude to the church for their financial support of the budget and to our staff and committee chairpersons for their hard work in developing the 2012 budget.

HISTORY COMMITTEE

The History Committee devoted much of its time in 2011 to our ongoing Dr. John Garber project. Members had been gathering stories, anecdotes and remembrances about Dr. Garber from current and former Hampton Baptist Church members, with an intended skit about his life as our goal. After considering several possible venues, we asked for and received permission to use the 2012 Annual Church Night skit as our "Tribute to Dr. Garber."

The History Committee also drafted guidelines, later approved by the Board of Deacons, for gifts (of letters, documents, memorabilia, artifacts, etc.) to the History Room.

The year 2016 marks the 225th anniversary of the founding of Hampton Baptist Church. The Deacons approved the History Committee's request to establish a committee to plan and coordinate celebration activities for the anniversary. In addition, Nancy Trimble found Christmas ornaments and Christmas cards from the 200th Anniversary celebration, and the Deacons approved our request to sell them (for a suggested donation of \$5.00 each) and use the proceeds as seed money for the 225th Committee to be named.

In 2010, the wooden ornament which had been knocked off the roof in the 1999 windstorm was returned to the History Room by Bev Doyer, with a base built by Frank Ranson. In 2011, Doug Heard constructed a glass case for the ornament so it could be safely displayed in the bookcase in the History Room. At the same time, Doug built a frame for a replaced stained glass window, which was hung in a window in the History Room.

On Bay Days weekend, September 9 ó 11, the History Committee trained docents and staffed tours of our historic sanctuary. We also had the new Stained Glass booklets available for sale.

The Historical Marker for HBC which had been approved by the City of Hampton has yet to be installed at the church.

INVESTMENT MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The stock market in 2011 as measured by the S&P 500 ended the year (1,258) at almost the same price as it started (1,257) despite record levels of volatility. The volatility was driven by the European monetary crisis, fear of global recession, and the down-grade of U.S. government debt and gridlock in Congress.

The majority of the equity investments in the church's portfolio mirrored the S&P 500 with little change in value. The exceptions are the International Stock Index Fund and the two bank holdings, Bank of America and Suntrust. The losses in these positions coupled with a net transfer of \$ 36,035 account for the overall change in the value of the portfolio.

During the year, the investment committee decided to adjust the asset allocation to bring it more in line with the stated objective of 60% equity, 40% fixed income. Thus, the Windsor Fund was liquidated and the proceeds reinvested in the Vanguard GNMA Fund. The current allocation is 58% equity, 42% fixed income.

MUSIC MINISTRY

The primary function of the Music Ministry remains twofold: to utilize choirs and instrumentalists in providing musical leadership of the highest quality for weekly worship services and special services and presentations, and to train the choir participants in musical skills, teamwork and church citizenship.

All the music ensembles ó Melody Choir, Concord Choir, Youth Choir, Steeple Singers, Victory Singers, Sanctuary Choir and Handbell Choir ó have been involved in church functions throughout the year, providing musical support for our multiple worship services. The Sanctuary Choir provides choral leadership almost every week. The Victory Singers provide leadership twice a month, the Steeple Singers once a month, and the Youth Choir and Concord Choir each sing once a month during the academic year. The Handbell Choir provides all service and special music at least twice a year. The Melody Choir sings about six times a year.

The Sanctuary Choir participated in the Ash Wednesday service and provided choral music for the Maundy Thursday Tenebrae service. For Palm Sunday, the Concord Choir and Middle School Youth Choir joined the Sanctuary Choir and Steeple Singers for an introit, and the Steeple Singers assisted the Sanctuary Choir for the Choral Benediction, *Meinem Jesum*, with organ, violin and viola. All the choirs participated in the anthem for the combined Thanksgiving service. In December, all the choirs participated in the single Service of Nine Lessons and Carols. Members of the Virginia Symphony joined the Sanctuary Choir for a presentation of Vivaldi's *Gloria*, praised by many as the finest ever. The Concord, Melody and Youth Choirs sang and performed in a December 14 Christmas Pageant, "Once Upon a Starry Night," directed by Alystra Barefoot.

Finally, in October the Sanctuary Choir returned for the fourth time in five years to sing the evening worship service for the Chester Brown/Hampton Baptist Church Preaching and Worship Conference at the Baptist Theological Seminary, Richmond. Once again, choir members also led as liturgists.

Our church opened its sanctuary doors for guided tours and organ demonstrations during Bay Days, September 9-11. Three scheduled organ demonstrations were provided, plus half a dozen or so impromptu demonstrations and discussions for interested folks who visited throughout the afternoons.

Hampton Baptist is fortunate to have so many talented musicians who share their gifts with the congregation throughout the year. Instrumentalists who assisted in services included: Brooke Puckett and Lynn Goetzke, flute; Mike Bjorklund, recorder and euphonium; Doug Heard, guitar; Robert Edahl,

saxophone; Rebecca Gilmore, cello; Vincent Zentner, harp; and our ðregularö friends from the Virginia Symphony. The harp for the Christmas Eve Candlelight Communion service was provided again through the generosity of Chester and Mary Etta Brown.

A generous donation from Rich Pulley and Michael Midgett provided new table covers for the Handbell Choir. They debuted when the Handbells played both services in Advent. In addition, a gift from Susie Castle has made possible for the Fine Arts Concert Series to be reinstated in 2012. A Music Endowment Fund was established in 2010, thanks to the seed money provided by Monika Malone, in memory of H.O. Malone, and by the family of Marion Hankinson in her memory. Other donations have helped the Fundö level increase. Once the fund has reached a certain level, interest from the principal will provide instrumental/vocal support for the music ministry, and provide a long term vehicle to acknowledge the great love of music and HBC held by Marion, Monica and other donors to the fund.

On the social front, the Sanctuary Choir held a October Choir Retreat to prepare music for Advent and Christmas. As usual, the retreat concluded with a cookout at the Matthewsö home. In January, the Sanctuary Choir gave a shower to celebrate the marriage of Greg and Lindsey Bane. PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

It has been a year of transition for the HBC and thus a very busy year for the Personnel Committee. In February, a vacancy came open for a Nursery Worker, and Melissa Ruble was hired to fill the position in March. We were very blessed to have church member Sandy Taylor join the staff as our Summer Childrens Worker. In July, our Senior Pastor Dr. Charles R. Smith announced that he had accepted a call as Pastor of the Madison Baptist Church in Madison, Georgia. Dr. Smiths last day was Thursday, August 18, 2011.

Following the guidance of the Constitution and Bylaws of HBC, the Personnel Committee members and the Officers of the Board of Deacons joined together to form an Interim Committee. The Interim Committee held their initial meeting on Sunday afternoon August 7th. The Rev. Eddie Heath, Field Strategist for the Virginia Baptist Mission Board met with the Committee providing guidance regarding the Interim Pastor search process. On November 29th, the Interim Committee recommended Rev David E. Roberts to be Interim Pastor, and also recommended the following church members to form the Pastor Search Committee: Betty Cain, Pat Garvey, Becky Glass, Matt Harlan, Gary Powell, Sarah Puckett, and Keith Ethridge (Personnel Chair). The HBC membership unanimously passed these two recommendations in a called business meeting, during the single service on Sunday, November 29th. Rev. Roberts first day at work will be Tuesday, January 10, 2012.

PREMISES COMMITTEE

The following is a list of the major tasks accomplished this year by members of the Premises Committee, our church Sexton, and others during 2011:

1. REPLACED THE CARPET IN THE SANCTUARY

- (a) Devised a computer graphics plan to remove and store all the pews in the sanctuary while the rug was being replaced by The Tile Shop, Inc.
- (b) Secured all loose flooring boards in the sanctuary prior to installation of the new rug by The Tile Shop, Inc.
- (c) Made two 32-inch spacers to assure proper spacing of the pews during replacement.
- (d) Removed the elevated platform that the rearmost center pew was situated upon.
- (e) Reinstalled the pews following rug replacement except for the three front row pews and the rearmost center section pew.

2. Removed inoperative chair lift from the stairs leading to the choir practice room.

3. Removed and disposed of the floor standing safe from the upstairs room next to the handbell practice room. The safe, which weighs probably 500 lbs, could not be accessed because the combination lock had been damaged beyond repair by homegrown vandals. Sidney Pearce helped remove the safe from the premises using his heavy equipment.

4. Purchased and installed two new light fixtures in the hallway that allow access to the South-side entrance to the choir loft.

5. Repaired the two sliding doors on one of the stainless steel cabinets in the kitchen. The welds securing the bottom guide tracks for the doors were broken. The tracks were pop-riveted back in place and the doors re-hung.

6. Installed automatic light switches in the downstairs mens and ladies restrooms as well as in the hallway accessing the North side entrance to the choir loft.

7. Did paint touchup job on the return air vents located in the risers of the steps that lead to the dais in the sanctuary.

PREMISES COMMITTEE CONTINUED

8. Made and installed six new thresholds for the doorways in the sanctuary. The unevenness of the floor levels at the piano-side as well as the baptistery-side doorways required thicker than ideal thresholds.
9. Removed the overhead-cabinet door in the sacristy. Made a rack to hold linens used for the monthly Communion Service. Installed the rack on the west wall of the sacristy. Hung a picture over the newly installed linen rack.
10. Purchased four new doorstops. Installed a new doorstop on each of the double doors separating the sanctuary from the North-side and South-side entrance vestibules.
11. Hired a roofing contractor to repair the leaking roof over the access hallway to the South side of the choir loft. After the roof was repaired we replaced a water-damaged board in the hallway. Scraped and painted the hallway walls.
12. Recommended to the deacons that all the asbestos should be removed from the nursery rooms (rooms 116 and 118). The estimate was \$9600. The estimated was presented to the deacons and denied.
13. Made and installed a new shelf in the ladies restroom near the Jones fellowship hall.
14. Replaced a frayed drive belt on the kitchen exhaust fan which is located on the roof over the kitchen.
15. Investigated why several of the sanctuary chandeliers were experience an inordinate number of blown light bulbs. The chandeliers become very hot because they are not vented properly. We, therefore, decided to modify the chandeliers by offsetting the bottom glass plate of each chandelier one inch to facilitate airflow. We also drilled ½ inch holes in the lower light socket of each chandelier to provide additional airflow. We had all of the chandeliers rewired with high-temperature wire at Cody's Lamp Shop.
16. In May the sewer pipes beneath the kitchen burst. We hired a contractor to pump the sewage from under the kitchen and repair the burst pipes.
17. Hired contractor to replace the awning over the Wine Street entrance doors.
18. Restored an old stained glass window that was replaced when new stained glass windows were installed in the sanctuary. Made a frame for the old stained glass window and installed it one of the windows in the History Room.
19. Made a glass display case for the finial that was knocked from the roof of the church when the steeple fell during a storm. Placed the finial displace case with the finial installed in a cabinet in the History Room.
20. Set up scaffolding to access an upstairs window in room 214. The brick wall was bulging outward, extended cracks were evident in the mortar joints, and the window lintel above the window was nearly rusted away. Significant water damage was evident a Sunday School room and in the library located below room 214. We removed the dilapidated window and covered the hole with a sheet of plywood. We hired a contractor to repair the brick wall and install a new lintel. We framed the window hole with two-by-four studs and covered the opening with plywood. We sealed the plywood cover with caulking and expanding foam.
21. Cleaned out room 214, which has been used as a junk storage room. We are in the process organizing this room to be used solely as a work room and to store items used for the maintenance of the church facility.
22. Renovated room 120. Hired contractors to fix a water leak in the pipes above the ceiling, remove all of the asbestos, and install a new dropped ceiling. We installed new rug tiles in the main room and composite vinyl tiles in the three anterooms. We also painted the entire room, installed new cove base molding, installed five new lighting fixtures, and installed an exhaust fan in the restroom. The cost submitted for insurance claims was \$11,923.68 of which \$1,270.56 for plumbing repair was not allowed because it was a wear and tear issue. In addition there was a \$1000.00 policy deductible. Therefore, we were reimbursed \$9,653.12. The cost of the lighting fixtures, curtains, paint, etc. were additional costs that were the responsibility of the church.

PREMISES COMMITTEE CONTINUED

23. Worked on all six fan/coil units in the choir practice room. Oiled all motors, fixed all the latches on the front cover plates, and installed new filters.
24. Modified three new choir hand bell tables to make the height of the tables adjustable to 6-1/2 inches higher so that they can be used in the sanctuary choir loft on the choir risers.
25. Purchased and installed a new hot water tank under the sink in the kitchenette.
26. Installed two new outside lights on each side of the double entrance doors on the North side of the sanctuary. Repaired the holes cut in the inside wall to access the electrical wiring connections.
27. Drained the water from the cooling tower for the sanctuary HVAC system.
28. Installed many new flush valves and valve repair kits in the various church restrooms.
29. Cut a 16x24 hole in the floor of room 104 to access and repair a leaking cold water pipe in the unisex bathroom. Room is adjacent to the unisex bathroom. Made a door to cover the access hole and reinstalled the rug to cover the access door in room 104.
30. Made and installed a metal grate to fit in one of the foundation vent holes on the south side of the church.
31. Cleaned out the clogged gutters and downspouts over the main entrance doors to the sanctuary from King's Way.
32. Cleaned the filters on each of the 5-ton A/C units that cool the Jones Fellowship Hall and the upstairs conference room. The valve handle on unit B had disintegrated. Made a new handle from aluminum. Replaced the leaky O-ring seals on the filter cover plug on unit B.

All of this work could not have been accomplished without the continued efforts of Doug Heard and Roy Austin. Phil and I would like to thank them for all of their work. We also need to thank our Sexton David Crawford and all other church members who have pitched in. We have an old building and maintaining it is an ongoing task.

SOUP KITCHEN MINISTRY

The 2010 & 2011 Hampton Baptist Soup Kitchen ministry continued to benefit from the generosity and commitment of both Hampton Baptist Church members and those in the surrounding community who join with us each week between Labor Day and Memorial Day to provide a nourishing meal to those in need. We began the year with close to \$5,000.00 and were able to raise a total of \$8,600.00 through Souper Bowl of caring, our Bay Days hot dog fund raiser, offerings from the church membership, a grant from the BGAV and a donation from the Elk's Lodge in Hampton. We spent \$7,300.00 which left us with a beginning balance of \$6,300.00 to begin the year.

Other than financial support, we have been blessed by the constant willingness of our HBC family to support soup kitchen needs through donated supplies, Halloween goody bags, Thanksgiving pies, Christmas cakes and end of year gift bags. These expressions of kindness, love, and support sustain our ministry. During the 2010-2011 year, we served over 3500 meals and clocked nearly 800 volunteer hours. We strive to provide a healthy and appealing meal to our guests each week moving away from processed foods and including more fresh fruit and vegetables. We continue to search out and accommodate all those in our community that wish to volunteer. During the 2010-11 season we had volunteers from various college nursing programs, volunteer servers from Chili's Restaurant on Mercury Blvd., as well as various individuals from the community.

SOUP KITCHEN MINISTRY CONTINUED

We started the 2011-12 season on September 12th and feel blessed to be able to minister to the needs of our brothers and sisters in the community. Although Alexis Ferenc has moved her membership to Costal Community Church, she is still the chief cook at our soup kitchen. SUNDAY SCHOOL

Sunday school continues to be an effective ministry in our church thanks to the continued hard work of our Associate Pastor, Sunday School teachers and volunteers, and Sunday School Council.

2011 was a year of continuing change for the Sunday School department. YOUTH COMMITTEE

2011 was a full and busy year for the student ministry program of our church. The first event of the year took place on Super Bowl Sunday with our annual Souper Bowl of Caring. The church donated 17 bags of groceries for H.E.L.P. and \$2,253.29 dollars for our Soup Kitchen ministry and A Night's Welcome.

To begin the Lenten season the middle school students hosted a Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper to help fund their summer trip to Camp Piankatank. This was the first time the church had ever had a Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper and in typical HBC fashion the membership showed their love for good food, fellowship and supported their students. The students made just under \$1000 with the supper.

The students once again led the Good Friday service by presenting "The Way of the Cross" which was a dramatic production that presented the last 24 hours of Jesus' life through the perspective of the Centurion that led the crucifixion detail. This was a meaningful and moving service that was attended by over 100 members, family members and friends.

In the spring the students led worship with the theme "God's Love Is Ours to Share." During the service students led worship through theme interpretations using sign language, dramas, creative readings and senior reflections by David Abeyounis, Marshall Pierce and Corin Sandford. In this service the students presented a wonderful challenge to the church to share God's love wherever we go and in whatever we do.

In the summer we took 13 students and 11 adults to Louisville, Kentucky for a mission trip. We served in a number of service opportunities with Wayside Christian Mission in downtown Louisville where we prepared and served meals in their soup kitchen. We also cleaned out, constructed shelves for and reorganized a massive storage warehouse, and did the same for one of their thrift stores. We also worked with Supplies Overseas which collects medical equipment and supplies from local hospitals and clinics and ships them overseas to meet medical needs in third world and impoverished countries. It wasn't all work while we were there as the group visited the Louisville Slugger Bat Factory and Museum, toured Churchill Downs and Museum, attended a Louisville Bats Baseball game and enjoyed a dinner cruise on the Belle of Louisville steamboat.

Also during the summer a group of 11 middle school students attend Camp Piankatank. It was a fun filled week full of outdoor activities, Bible studies and worship. One of our students made a profession of faith while at camp and two other students who attended made professions of faith in church. In September we baptized Blake Matter, Emma North and Mandi Mumford and, later in the fall, Micah Sandford made his profession of faith and was baptized.

Following Charles' resignation I began to lead the adult Wednesday evening Bible studies until an interim pastor could be obtained. This took the entire fall which required others to help lead the Wednesday evening student program. A ministry team was developed which consisted of Mike and Kassandra Bond, Jamie Kurtz, Patrick O'Bryan and Ben Sandford to work with our students. They stepped up and did a fantastic job and lead fun fellowship activities and Bible study each week. I appreciate their willingness to invest their time in the lives of our youth. I am also thankful that they will continue to serve and help on a consistent weekly basis in the future.

One of the big efforts we undertook was the planning and fundraising for the Faith in 3D student conference which would take place in Orlando, Florida in January 2012 (Which was awesome!). The church and community supported the youth as we worked 2 parking lots during Bay Days, hosted a Suds & Spuds (Potato Bar & Car Wash), HBC Day at Jason's Deli and sold Christmas Eve Luminaries to raise the funds for our plane tickets and conference fees.

Thanks to everyone that continues to support the student ministry through serving, praying, and sharing words of affirmation and encouragement. The students and I continue to be blessed by your love, support and encouragement.
